'Food handouts are the not long-term answer for Ethiopia', says famine survivor as 23m are pushed to the brink

An Ethiopian charity worker says food handouts are not a long-term solution to the threat of starvation faced by 23 million east Africans.

Birhan Woldu, whose emaciated appearance moved the world during the Band Aid campaign 25 years ago, says the charity which saved her own life is now failing Africa's poorest.

Her comments came as Ethiopia appealed for 59,410 tons of emergency aid to feed 6.2 million people, on the anniversary of the notorious famine which saw more than a million perish.

Mitiku Kassa, the country's State Minister for Agriculture and Rural Development said that due to a five-year drought, the number of people needing emergency assistance between October to December 2009 had risen to 6.2 million from 4.9 million.

But Ms Woldu, who composed a foreword to an Oxfam report released yesterday, says handouts encourage dependency and are uneconomic.

She said: 'Twenty-five years ago, my life was saved by Irish nursing sisters who gave me an injection and food from organisations like Band Aid.

'So it may seem strange for me to say now that to get food aid from overseas is not the best way.

'As well as being demeaning to our dignity, my education has taught me that constantly shipping food is costly, uneconomic and can encourage dependency.'

The report calls for an end to what it calls 'knee-jerk' reactions to food crises that focused on sending food aid and appealed for longer-term solutions.

According to Oxfam, 91 per cent of humanitarian aid given to Ethiopia so far this year has been food. Only 0.14 per cent of the aid was spent on preparing the people for future droughts.

Ms Woldu said: 'Let us grow our own food and help manage our own systems so we are not hit so hard when the next drought or flood comes.

'We need to approach disasters in a different way that is more dignified and more sustainable than imported food aid.'

Aid workers say the prolonged drought has affected much of the Horn of Africa, including Kenya and Somalia.

Drought is especially disastrous in Ethiopia because more than 80 percent of people live off the land.

The cycle of drought used to come around every ten years but now it is almost constant. Many attribute the changing patterns to climate change.
